PRESENTER BIOS

Honorable Sharon Chatman, is a member of the Superior Court of Santa Clara County. She is currently the supervising judge of the Domestic Violence Courts. Before her appointment to the bench she was a prosecutor for the Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office for ten years. She prosecuted a variety of crimes from murder to crimes of street gangs. Judge Chatman in 2002 was on the faculty and taught domestic violence at B. E. Witkin Judicial College of California. Judge Chatman serves as a consultant to the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, National Association of Drug Court Professionals, and the Department of Justice. She earned her law degree from the University of California, Hastings College of the Law. Prior to joining the district attorney's office, Judge Chatman was the head women's basketball coach at San Jose State University for ten years and in 1999 was selected as women's basketball coach of the century. In October 2004 she will be inducted into the San Jose State University Sports Hall of Fame. In 2001 she was selected as one of the ten most influential African Americans in the bay area.

Jennifer Rose has been working as an advocate & activist to end violence against women and children for the past 20 years. Currently Jennifer is the residential services director at La Casa de Las Madres in San Francisco, Ca. Prior to working at La Casa, Jennifer was the director of domestic violence services at the Walnut Avenue Women's Center, In this role she worked to build a program that provided both crisis intervention and long-term advocacy and support for women and their families. In this role she also opened a supervised visitation center that was part of a national demonstration initiative funded through the Office of Violence Against Women. Jennifer is the co-founder of Inspire Action for Social Change and is currently working as a consultant, locally and nationally, to provide training and technical assistance on the issues of violence against women and girls, supervised visitation and safe exchange, engaging men who batter, oppression, community organizing, and LGBTQ issues. Jennifer works as a consultant to Futures without Violence, The National Resource Center on Domestic Violence, and The National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges. Jennifer received her BA in Anthropology and Women's Studies from Fort Lewis College and her MSW from San Jose State University.
